# Dog Dollars and Sense

Using either teacher-supplied costs or researching costs from supplied websites, students estimate the initial cost of acquiring a dog, and the annual costs of maintaining it. Possible options include buying from a pet store or adopting from an animal shelter.

# Activity

# Dog Dollars and Sense

This exercise involves research, estimating and budgeting. It's a good way to give students an idea of the costs of pet ownership before they are committed, as well as showing the variation between costs of purchase and adoption. To start, have students determine what sex, breed (or large, medium or small if mixed breed) and whether they will purchase or adopt from a shelter.

The estimates will vary; students can research the costs several ways:

Cost of obtaining a dog and initial medical costs by calling local pet shops, looking in classified ads, or online. (If you want to find out adoption fees from a local shelter, it's best

if just one student calls and shares the information with others so that shelter staff/volunteer time is not taken up.

Annual veterinary costs can be determined by calling local veterinarians, groomers and trainers.

Supplies and food can be checked by a trip to a pet store or by reading through a newspaper flyer.

### Notes:

Adoption fees are significantly lower than purchasing a dog at a store. There are many good dogs awaiting adoption at animal shelters. Often, adoption fees include spay/neuter procedures, initial exams and vaccinations. Spaying and neutering is a small cost compared to the cost of looking after a litter of pups.

# **Extension**

Students can create a time budget to reinforce the concept that pets require a serious time commitment. Activities such as walking the dog on a daily basis, brushing, feeding, play time, training, and visits to the veterinarian should all be included.

## Solution

Amounts will vary, but you can expect initial to range from about \$400 for a dog adopted from a shelter to \$1000 or more for a dog purchased from a pet store or breeder. Annual costs are typically in the \$1200 to \$2000 range.
